



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Growing Your Seeds

Growing your seeds is much easier than you may think. Each pack will cover one square metre.

Sowing Instructions:

The seeds are best sown in the spring after the frosts have passed and can be sown up until the end of the summer.

Each pack of seeds will cover one square metre. To prepare your seed bed, first remove all weeds, then dig over the soil to create a fresh bed.

Sprinkle your seeds over the area equally, then rake the wildflower seeds into the soil and moisten the ground well.

Water your seedlings and flowers regularly such as twice a week and more often throughout the hotter, dryer months.

Further Information:

Wildflowers are an essential food source and habitat for many species of animals and pollinating insects such as bees, butterflies and moths.

What's in the pack?

The seeds provided are a high quality, comprehensive mixture suitable for a wide range of soil types and features wildflowers that are pure and colourful garden plants which are perfect for creating a beautiful mini wildflower meadow in your own school.

The flower species in your pack will include: Paper Daisy, Pheasant Eye, Pot Marigold, Cornflower, Dwarf Morning Glory, Evening Primrose, Forget-Me-Not, California Poppy, Baby's Breath, Love-in-a-Mist, Corn Poppy, Golden Tickseed, Blue Lupin, Borage, Purple Tansy, Blanket flower, Clarkia, Cosmos Mixed, Marsh Mallow and Clovers.


Photos of all the above flowers are on the following page so your pupils can cross them off as they start to bloom.

Will they grow back every year? The mixture includes annuals and perennials which provide colour from the first year. Avoid picking the flowers to enable the self seeding flowers to grow back year after year. You could even pick some of the dried flower heads and save the seeds so you can plant them elsewhere, expanding your meadow or gifting them to pupils or other schools. You will be surprised how many seeds just one poppy head produces.




